To foster **safe, healthy, supportive, and drug free environments** that support student academic achievement



To provide all students with a **well-rounded education**



To increase access to **personalized, rigorous learning experiences supported by the use of technology** to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students.

### ESSA What does ESSA Say?

#### How Can Title IV-A Student Support and Enrichment Grant Funds Be Used?<sup>1</sup>

##### To Provide a Well-Rounded Education

- College and career guidance and counseling programs
- Accelerated learning programs
- Programs and activities to improve instruction and student engagement across multiple disciplines (e.g. music, STEM, P.E. civics, economics, etc.)
- Programs and activities that promote volunteerism and community involvement

##### To Improve the Use of and Access to Technology<sup>2</sup>

- Professional learning tools, devices, content, and resources for educators, school leaders, and administrators.
- Technological capacity and infrastructure
- Development of innovative strategies for the delivery of specialized or rigorous academic courses or curricula
- Blended learning projects
- Professional development in the use of technology
- Access and resources to high quality digital learning experiences for students in rural, remote, and underserved areas

##### To Improve School Conditions for Student Learning

- Drug and violence prevention activities
- School based mental health services and partnership programs that:
  - integrate health/safety practices into school or athletic programs;
  - support a healthy, active lifestyle;
  - help prevent bullying and harassment;
  - improve instructional practices for developing relationship-building skills;
  - provide mentoring and school counseling;
  - establish or improve school dropout and re-entry programs; and/or
  - establish learning environments to enhance students' effective learning skills.
- High quality training for school personnel related to emergency and crisis situations
- Child abuse awareness and prevention programs
- Programming to reduce exclusionary discipline practices in schools
- Designation of a school or district site resource coordinator to support schools and community partnerships

#### What are the Parameters?

Eligibility amount	Requirement for School District
Less than \$10,000	a school district must either refuse its funds or form a consortium with one or more other school districts, where the school districts' combined funds are equal to or exceed \$10,000
\$10,000 - \$29,999	a school district may spend its funds on any allowable activities
\$30,000	a school district must conduct a needs assessment <sup>3</sup> and spend funds for activities in all three distinct areas: well-rounded education, safe and healthy schools, and technology

2. Awardees may not spend more than 15% of funds on devices, equipment, software applications, platforms, digital instructional resources and/or other one-time technology purchases.



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## Title IV, Part A, Student Support and Academic Enrichment



### What Does This Mean For New Jersey Districts?

Districts and/or consortia are required to submit an application to the NJDOE to receive their Title IV-A program allocation.<sup>3</sup> **During the design and development of its application, Local Education Agencies (LEAs) must engage in consultation with stakeholders** in the area [section 4106(c)(1)]. Such stakeholders must include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Parents
- Teachers
- Principals
- Students
- School leaders
- Charter school personnel, when applicable
- Specialized instructional support personnel
- Indian tribes or tribal organizations, when applicable
- Local government representatives
- Others with relevant and demonstrated expertise
- Community-based organizations

#### Other Uses: Option to Transfer Funds

Title IV-A funds may be transferred to and used for activities under:

- Improving Basic Programs Operated by LEAs [Title I-A]
- Supporting Effective Instruction [Title II-A]
- English Language Acquisition, Language Enhancement, and Academic Achievement [Title III-A]
- Rural Education [Title V-B]

Other stakeholders to engage might include: members from the business community, health providers, police, social workers, librarians, technology experts, service providers, and faith-based community leaders.



### Questions to Consider

- Which stakeholders can help identify local needs and/or root causes? How can they be engaged early and in a meaningful way throughout the process?
- If you come from a district that will have a Title IV-A allocation below \$10,000, would you consider forming a consortium with other districts? Which other districts would you consider working with?
- If you come from a district that will have a small Title IV-A allocation, would you consider transferring your Title IV-A funds to a different Title?
- How could you combine Title IV-A funds with local and state resources to maximize impact? Are there programs or initiatives your school district is currently rolling out that these funds could be used to support?
